TEXAS MANDATORY REPORTING OF STATUTORY RAPE

The age of consent in Texas is 17. Texas law mandates a report to law enforcement when a health care facility encounters a sexually active female child 13 or younger. For girls 14, 15, or 16, a report is mandated if the child's sex partner is 3 or more years older than the victim.

This news conference will reveal statutory rape reporting data that fits into the national pattern of Planned Parenthood's failure to report statutory rape of their clients as required by laws in various states.

In May of this year, Lila Rose, a UCLA sophomore, visited two Los Angeles county Planned Parenthood clinics. She told abortion counselors that she was 15 and was impregnated by her 23 year-old boyfriend. Both clinics encouraged her to lie about her age to circumvent a required statutory rape report under California law and to protect her boyfriend. The following dialogue at the Santa Monica Planned Parenthood clinic was captured on videotape.

Planned Parenthood: "If you're 15, we have to report it. If you're not, if you're older than that, then we don't need to."

15-year-old: "Okay, but if I just say I'm not 15, then it's different? So I could just say..."

Planned Parenthood: "You could say 16."

15-year-old: "I could say 16?"

Planned Parenthood: "Yes."

15-year-old: "Okay, yeah. So I would just write 16?"

Planned Parenthood: "Well, just figure out a birth date that works. And I don't know anything."

In 2002, Life Dynamics of Denton, Texas investigated Planned Parenthood clinics nationwide with undercover telephone calls to clinics. The phone calls showed a clear pattern of concealment of statutory rape. The female caller pretended to be 13 and impregnated by her 22 year-old boy friend. Life Dynamics made 800 phone calls to Planned Parenthood clinics. For 91% of the calls, the girl was urged to conceal or lie about her age. The record of statutory rape reporting by Planned Parenthood in Waco has been obtained by Pro-Life Waco through a investigator using the Texas open records law. We strived to obtain the record of reports of statutory rape—not the names of any of the female victims.

For Planned Parenthood, the mandatory reporting of statutory rape would of course come into play when girls 16 and under seek abortions. But, this is by no means just an issue relating to abortion. Any indication of statutory rape as defined in Texas law would trigger a mandatory report to law enforcement. This would include an underage girl coming to Planned Parenthood for contraception or an underage girl coming into Planned Parenthood for a sexually transmitted disease.

Pro-Life Waco’s first investigation sought the records of the Waco Police Department since both of the Planned Parenthood Waco clinics are located within the city limits of Waco. We obtain the data for 2000-2005 and reported this information at a Nobody’s Fool news conference last July. Planned Parenthood Waco made just 20 reports to the Waco Police Department for sex-related matters. We assume all of these reports were for possible statutory rape of females 16 and under. However, some may have been for other reasons. We give Planned Parenthood the benefit of the doubt and assume that all were for underage sex. The 20 reports amounted to an average of only 3.3 reports per year. In 2000, Planned Parenthood Waco made no police reports for statutory rape. On the other hand, in 2000 Planned Parenthood did make three police reports regarding stray animals.

In addition to being so few in number, the Planned Parenthood police reports indicate a very unusual pattern. For four years, there were either zero or one report. Then in 2004 the number jumped to 13. In March of 2004, there were six police reports—more than the entirety of 2000-2003! Are we to believe that statutory rape was committed much more 2004 than any of the other years?

The Executive Director of Planned Parenthood Waco was asked about Pro-Life Waco numbers on reporting of statutory rape for a *Waco Tribune Herald* news story of July 27, 2006. The Planned Parenthood CEO claimed 147 reports of statutory rape of their clients for the previous year and a half. If this were true, this would amount to 98 reports per year—a huge discrepancy compared to the 3.3 figure from Pro-Life Waco.

Nobody's Fool again draws protest

About 40 rally against sex education program

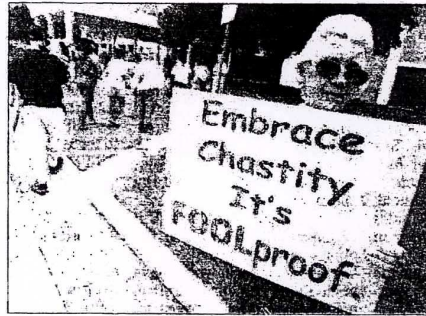
Waco anti-abortion activist John Pisciotta's repeat protest of Planned Parenthood's annual Nobody's Fool conference came and went quietly Wednesday with about 40 supporters rallying with him at the Waco Convention Center, waving signs such as "Embrace chastity: It's foolproof" and "Abortion stops a beating heart." Planned Parenthood executive di-

rector Pam Smallwood said that, after 17 years of hosting Nobody's Fool and witnessing such protests. "I don't understand what motivates our opposition."

More than 400 youngsters converged at the Waco Convention Center for the half-day seminar focusing on various subjects such as anatomy, peer pressure and contraceptives.

Pisciotta, who leads Pro-Life Waco, said he believes Nobody's Fool sends mixed messages to students by teaching abstinence while also promoting the use of contraceptives and

approaching the subject of sex "in a recreational manner."

"Implicitly, what you're teaching is "This is what we expect you to do," he said.

"I think it's fair to say that Planned Parenthood's central issue with regard to sex is health choices," he said, "and for those of us who oppose them, we feel much more that there are (also) moral choices, and virtuous choices."

Nobody's Fool addresses topics in three broad areas of education for fifth- through ninth-graders: general sexuality, which addresses puberty and

sexual development; HIV and sexually transmitted diseases; and sexual abuse.

"Each grade has an age-appropriate program," Smallwood said, adding that students are divided up by grade and gender.

Smallwood said the only other evidence of anti-conference sentiment that she saw prior to the conference were two paid advertisements published in the *Tribune-Herald*, submitted by a group not affiliated with Pisciotta.

"Other than the ads, I would say it's been smooth sailing," she said. "I think there's no question that Waco understands this is a mainstream event."

Pisciotta held a brief news conference at the convention center, presenting his own research suggesting that Planned

Parenthood had under-reported instances of statutory rape during the past six years. He said he found only 20 instances in which the clinic reported statutory rape cases to the Waco Police Department between 2000 and 2005.

Smallwood dismissed the claim, saying her own quick research turned up 147 reports made between February 2004 and Wednesday.

"He doesn't have all his facts straight," she said.

We asked for the advice of others on whether the Planned Parenthood claim could possibly be true. We learned that a significant number of additional reports might have been made to the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services in Austin. TDFPS has a convenient computer-based system for reporting statutory rape and other forms of child abuse. On-line reporting to TDFPS has become the preferred way of reporting for most health organizations. The details of this on-line reporting system are contained in Appendix 2.

Pro-Life Waco sought information about statutory rape reports with the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services for years that would include the time Planned Parenthood claimed reports at the rate of 98 per year.

In November of 2006, after much negotiation, our investigator was able to obtain TDFPS reports of underage sex from the addresses of the Planned Parenthood clinics in Waco. The information received of TDFPS is shown in Appendix C. The reports from the address of 1211 Ross Ave are Planned Parenthood Waco.

There were indeed reports by Planned Parenthood Waco to the TDFPS—but only at about the same annual rate as the Waco Police Department. Table 2 summarizes reports to the Texas Department of Family and Protective services. Instead of close to a hundred, the annual rate of reporting to TDFPS was no more than four.

*Pro-Life Waco actually received data indicating that Planned Parenthood Waco made just four reports to TDFPS through November of 2006. To be more than fair to Planned Parenthood, Table 2 assumes two additional reports were made in December of 2006.

To summarize, Planned Parenthood claimed statutory rape reports last July at a rate of 98 per year. Pro-Life Waco finds reports to the Waco PD and TDFPS of just 7.3 per year using very generous assumptions. **Where are the other 91 reports per year!**

The differential is huge and the legal issue is even bigger. This is not just about make-believe conversations with Planned Parenthood counselors revealing an obvious intent to avoid the law for mandatory reporting of statutory rape.

There are cases where the bodies and souls of real children have been wounded by Planned Parenthood failure to report statutory rape of its child-clients.

In March of 2005, a law suit against Planned Parenthood of Southwest Ohio was filed on behalf of a child “Jane Roe.” She was impregnated by her

soccer coach when she was just 14 years old. The rapist took her to Planned Parenthood of Southwest Ohio in 2004. Although she received an abortion and contraception, no mandated report to law enforcement was filed.

In another legal case file against Planned Parenthood of Southwest Ohio on May 7, Denise Banks was raped by her father John Banks for 5 years beginning at age 13. She became pregnant in 2004 and was taken to a Planned Parenthood clinic in Cincinnati for an abortion. When Denise found herself alone with a clinic worker, she revealed that she had been raped by her father. No law enforcement report was filed by Planned Parenthood of Southwest Ohio and Denise continued to be raped for another year and half. When she went to college, she confided to a basketball coach about what had happened to her. John Banks is now serving five years in prison.

In New London, Connecticut, Kevin Walker, age 22, was arrested in June of this year for the repeated rape of a Jane Roe child. Walker impregnated her three times between April and September of 2006. The resulting abortions at Planned Parenthood in Norwich failed to trigger mandated reports of statutory rape.

For a second case in Connecticut, an unrelated June police investigation of Adam Gault, age 41, discovered that he was holding Danielle Cramer, a 15 year old runaway. Further investigation determined that she had recently had an abortion in Planned Parenthood of Hartford Connecticut. Tragically, there was no report of statutory rape.

Not reporting underage sex as required by law leaves minor girls as victims and vulnerable to more exploitation by sexual predators. This is unconscionable.

**Whether in Ohio, Connecticut or Texas,
Planned Parenthood should not be above the law!**
